From the President

I hope that you're finding time to relax and enjoy your summer! Things are reasonably quiet in western Fairfax County as is typical during the summer months. We are starting to see some forward motion on key transportation projects that have been approved and funded. By now you have noticed (or have been directly affected) by the modifications to Route 28 at the intersection of Walney and Braddock Roads. It clearly has made a difference in traffic flow and we'll see how long it holds up. The last interchanges to be constructed on Route 28 between I-66 and the Dulles Toll Road (the Willard and Frying Pan Roads intersections) are scheduled to start this fall and be completed in the fall of 2009. Other funded transportation projects in the pipeline include the Stone Road safety improvements (beginning this summer), the Stringfellow Road widening project (the public comment period is complete), and

Hanley Family Shelter Ribbon-Cutting set for August 4th

The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors invites you to the Katherine K. Hanley Family Shelter Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony on Saturday, August 4, 2007 at 11:00 a.m. The Hanley Family Shelter, an integral part of the county's plan to prevent and end homelessness, will accommodate up to 20 families at a time, providing temporary shelter as residents move toward self-sufficiency and permanent housing. The shelter is located at the intersection of Route 29 and Meadow Estates Road; it will be operated by Shelter House, Inc.

Please note that no parking will be available at the site of the ribbon-cutting ceremony. Attendees are asked to park in the front parking lot of the Pennino Building (12011 Government Center Parkway, across the street from the County Government Center). Fastran buses will transport attendees to the site beginning at 10:15 a.m. and will return them to the Pennino Building after the ceremony.

There will be tours of the facility and light refreshments served from noon to 2:00 p.m.

WFCCA Elects Land Use Committee and Chairs at April Meeting

At its April 16, 2007 quarterly meeting, the WFCCA elected Land Use Committee members to serve the next year. Prior to the election, the membership approved a by-law amendment reducing the number of Land Use Committee members from eleven to nine. Reelected are: Mary Coyle (*At-Large*), Carol Hawn (*At-Large*), James Katcham (*Centre Ridge Regent*), Scott Miller (*Pleasant Valley Neighborhood Coalition*), Jim Neighbors (*Sully Station I*), Dorothy Steranka (*Willoughby's Ridge*), Chris Terpak-Malm (*At-Large*), and Ted Troscianecki (*Virginia Run*). Joining them is Judith Heisinger (*Bull Run*), who returns to the Committee after a hiatus. After the quarterly meeting, the Committee reelected Mr. Katcham as Chair.

In addition to the Land Use Committee elections, the WFCCA also elected the following Standing Committee Chairs to serve for the next year: Education - E. Mark McConn (*At-Large*), Environment - Stephen Vandivere (*At-Large*), Parks and Recreation - Mrs. Terpak-Malm, Social Services and Outreach - Ms. Steranka, and Transportation - Mrs. Heisinger. The WFCCA thanks Ron Koch and Jim Hart for again serving as the Nominating Committee.

Treasurer's Report

On January 15, 2007, WFCCA cash on hand balance totaled \$3,579.30. There were no disbursements and receipts totaled \$375.00. Therefore, as of April 16, 2007, the cash on hand balance for the WFCCA is \$3,954.30.

continued improvements to I-66 in Prince William County. For information on these and other VDOT projects, visit www.virginia.gov/projects.

Have you noticed the construction activity across from the Centreville Regional Library? Knolls Redevelopment, Landmark Communities has demolished the Knolls of Newgate apartments (most recently called Sunset Knolls) and will be replacing them with luxury townhouses. Planned are 176 townhouses and 15 affordable dwelling units, or 191 units total. Other development activity underway (or starting soon) is the Sangrias Restaurant (at the Routes 28 and 29 interchange - you can't miss it) due to open in the fall and the redevelopment of the northeast corner of that interchange to add a Walgreens and Bank of America. The groundbreaking for the Korean Central Presbyterian Church on Route 29 is scheduled for July 14, 2007.

The fall will be quickly approaching and with it the election of all local officials, among other referendum items. Stay tuned and visit our website for more information: www.wfccca-sully.org, or email me with questions or comments at president@wfcca-sully.org.

Draft Quarterly Meeting Minutes**

Monday, April 16, 2007

James D. McDonnell Community Room 1, Sully District Governmental Center

President Ted Trosciancki called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m. and led a moment of silence to reflect on the tragedy at Virginia Tech University. He introduced the Executive Committee, as well as Rex Simmons, 40th District House Democratic candidate.

Admission of New Member Communities - There were no applications for new member communities. Stephen Vandivere requested At-Large membership in the WFCCA, having served for many years as the Cabell's Mill Homeowners Association Representative. *Mrs. Coyle moved Mr. Vandivere's At-Large membership; James Katcham seconded. Motion carried unanimously.*

Adoption of WFCCA By-Laws Amendments - Carol Hawn introduced the two by-law amendments published in the Spring 2007 edition of *the Pioneer*. The first decreases the number of Land Use Committee members from eleven to nine; the quorum would remain at five. *Mr. Trosciancki moved adoption of the amendment as published. Mrs. Coyle seconded. Motion carried unanimously.*

The second pertains to membership of the following Standing Committees: Education, Environment, Parks and Recreation, Social Services and Outreach, and Transportation. The recommended by-law is: "Chair shall be the representative or alternate of a member Association, or a member-at-large, in good standing and shall be elected by majority vote of the members present at a meeting of the WFCCA. Volunteers acceptable to the Chair may serve on the Committee. However, no more than one half of the Committee membership can be non-representatives nor alternates from the same Association." *Mr. Trosciancki moved adoption; Mrs. Coyle seconded.* This could limit the number of potential Committee members a Chair could accept. Mr. Trosciancki noted the spirit of this amendment is to have a committee with diverse representation; at present, you could have one group or association inordinately influence a committee issue or action. *James Hart recommended that "non-representatives nor alternates" be deleted. Motion, as amended, carried unanimously.* The by-laws will be posted on the website once updated.

Election of Land Use Committee - On behalf of himself and Sully District Supervisor Michael Frey, Ron Koch, Nominating Committee Chair, thanked the past years' Land Use Committee members for their service. He noted that by urging developers to meet with the Land Use Committee first, applications go through the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors much more easily. The Committee is fair, and often comes up with good ideas. He introduced the nominees for the 2007 - 2008 Committee: Mrs. Coyle (*At-Large*), Mrs. Hawn (*At-Large*), Judith Heisinger (*Bull Run*), Mr. Katcham (*Centre Ridge Regent*), Scott Miller (*Pleasant Valley Neighborhood Coalition*), Jim Neighbors (*Sully Station I*), Dorthy Steranka (*Willoughby's Ridge*), Chris Terpak-Malm (*At-Large*), and Mr. Trosciancki (*Virginia Run*). There were no nominations from the floor; therefore, *Mr. Koch moved the slate be adopted by acclamation; Mr. Katcham seconded. Motion carried unanimously.*

President's Report - Mr. Trosciancki commented on how moved he felt by the day's events. As a community, we need to support whatever is necessary to stop this type of violence. One way to do this is by becoming active in your community, and encourage others to also become involved. The WFCCA is still struggling with membership; he will work with Ms. Steranka on this. There is between 70 and 90 persons on the email distribution list; they need to be contacted to ensure their communities have renewed membership. He is in the process of simplifying the WFCCA website.

Scott Miller asked about merging the WFCCA and Sully District Council. Mr. Vandivere wondered if there are differences in the focus of the two groups; if boundaries are the only difference, and we are interested in collaborating with other groups, why don't we simply enlarge our boundaries. Both organizations serve now-predominately built-out areas, unlike some years ago. Mr. Neighbors doesn't believe it would add much to the WFCCA Land Use Committee load to combine the two. Mrs. Hawn noted that the 1991 redistricting transferred a large number of member communities from Sully to Springfield District. Each group is independent; unlike some umbrella groups, Supervisor Frey doesn't appoint the membership. The Executive Committee will continue discussing the issue.

Secretary's Report - There will be primary elections on Tuesday, June 12, 2007; polls will open at 6:00 a.m. In the WFCCA area, there are Democratic Primaries in the 40th House and 39th State Senate Districts, and a Republican Primary for Springfield District Supervisor. The Centreville Community Foundation is becoming a Jamestown 2007 Community; the first meeting was this evening.

Treasurer's Report - Mrs. Coyle reported on January 15, 2007, WFCCA cash on hand balance totaled \$3,579.30. There were no disbursements and receipts totaled \$375.00. Therefore, as of April 16, 2007, the cash on hand balance for the WFCCA is \$3,954.30.

Education Committee - Mark McConn discussed the School Board budget schedule. He noted that Verizon has now provided cable access to the Bull Run area; residents are now able to receive public government and school channels. Mrs. Hawn mentioned the WFCCA should send a thank you to Verizon; although this was a purely economic move, and not necessarily out of the goodness of their heart, it took over a decade for cable orphans to be served. To whom should it be sent? Mr. McConn is tracking in-state college admission rates and traveled to Richmond regarding this issue. A bill requiring that 75% of state university enrollments be in-state students didn't get out of committee. Universities are attempting to recruit more out-of-state students due to increased tuition and cultural diversity. Mr. Trosciancki asked what percentage of college funds are tax versus tuition dollars. Mr. Simmons noted that ten years ago, 70% of students were from Virginia, that is now only 30%. Twenty-five percent of Virginia Tech students are from the Northern Virginia region; it takes a 3.6 to 3.8 GPA to be admitted, which is highly competitive. Mr. Miller mentioned another concern in an increasingly complex world is that not enough American students are obtaining advanced degrees in sciences and technology. Mr. Hart mentioned that the competition for out-of-state students is significantly greater; if the mix includes more in-state students, averages drop; changing the mix devalues the aggregate and lowers standards. The University of Virginia Law School no longer receives public funds; he added that the percentage is very controversial and many don't see a harm in getting the best students. Mr. Miller noted the solution is more funding for our college system.

Environment Committee - Mr. Wanek resigned in January; we will need to elect a new Chair.

Land Use Committee - Mr. Katcham noted that the Land Use Committee may not be reviewing as many cases as in the past, but the current cases are equally challenging and in some cases, even more so. He reviewed the agenda for tomorrow evening's meeting and upcoming presentations. He sent the noise monitor letter and will follow with an email. Mr. Miller followed that his community remains concerned about airport issues, primarily noise and aircraft landing issues.

Parks and Recreation Committee - The Park Bond referendum passed last November. The Board of Supervisors purchased the Rice property on Wharton Lane

By-Laws Amendments Adopted

At its April 16, 2007 quarterly meeting, the WFCCA membership adopted two by-law amendments. The first decreases the Land Use Committee membership from eleven to nine. The second clarifies the chair position and membership of the following Standing Committees: Education, Environment, Parks and Recreation, Social Services and Outreach, and Transportation. With regard to this, the by-laws now read as follows:

"Chair shall be the representative or alternate of a member Association, or a member-at-large, in good standing and shall be elected by majority vote of the members present at a meeting of the WFCCA. Volunteers acceptable to the Chair may serve on the Committee. However, no more than one half of the Committee membership can be from the same Association."

in the Historic District. The Board of Supervisors approved the Cub and Bull Runs Master Watershed Plan. Mr. Vandivere took part in the Cub Run cleanup, with over 300 volunteers. Twelve worked in the Flatlick Branch and pulled out a lot of trash; Mr. Miller pulled over 21 bags of trash near Pleasant Valley, of which 90% was recyclable. Steve Chulick asked if trash trucks could be required to contain trash so it doesn't fly out of the back of their vehicles. Mr. Koch announced the Northern Virginia Model Airplane Club would be holding a demonstration off Bull Run Post Office Road. Mr. McConn is concerned about the effect the planes, as well as gypsy moth spraying planes, will have on horses in the area. He spoke against the proposal, and believes it will spook the horses. Mrs. Hawn believes people need to see and hear the planes before passing judgment.

Transportation Committee – Mr. Vandivere announced construction will soon begin on the Route 28/Braddock and Walney Roads intersection. It is now an official VDOT project; updates will be available on their website. There was plenty of time for comment, which has now passed. Although VDOT picked up some constructive comments, not everyone's concerns were addressed and a number of good suggestions were ignored; there was little follow-through. We don't know the impact on the local communities. VDOT is currently taking traffic measurements in Cabell's Mill. Supervisor Frey's office should be contacted to see exactly what baselines are being measured. Sequoia Farms remains concerned about cut-through traffic and pedestrian safety. Flashing signs are on I-66, and Routes 28 and 29. Closures occur on May 5, 2007. There was discussion on exactly what exits are affected. The project is only a band aid solution. Mr. Chulick asked about closing Walney Road through E.C. Lawrence Park. The Willard Road interchange project will begin soon and take 14 to 18 months. It is now a major chokepoint on Route 28 for both Loudoun and Fairfax County residents. The Poplar Tree and Stringfellow Roads widenings will be on the November 2007 transportation referendum. The Transportation bill is in the General Assembly at this time.

Committee Chair Elections – Mr. Katcham moved Mr. McConn as Education Committee Chair. Mrs. Coyle seconded. Mrs. Coyle moved Mr. Vandivere as Environment Committee Chair. Ms. Steranka seconded. Mr. Vandivere expressed some concern about the time commitment, but agreed to serve. Mrs. Coyle moved Mrs. Terpak-Malm as Parks and Recreation Committee Chair. Ms. Steranka seconded. Mrs. Hawn moved Ms. Steranka as Social Services and Outreach Committee Chair. Mrs. Coyle seconded. Ed Glade moved Mrs. Heisinger as Transportation Committee Chair. Mr. Katcham seconded. All motions carried unanimously.

Old Business - Mr. Hart mentioned county staff is investigating a massage parlor in the Historic District. They did acquire a non-residential use permit. Staff is slowly continuing to follow-up on Wilson Trucking violations. Incorrect notices were given in the past, most recently five years ago. A Special Exception Amendment was filed but not approved and enforcement didn't pick up again. Mr. Glade noted that erosion is occurring at their site. Mr. McConn believes they are filling in a flood plain. They are also selling mulch. Zoning Enforcement needs to hear about these potential violations. With no further business, Mrs. Coyle moved adjournment; Mr. Trosciancki seconded. Motion carried unanimously and the meeting adjourned at 8:52 p.m. Upon adjournment of the quarterly meeting, the Land Use Committee members reelected Mr. Katcham as Committee Chair.

Precinct Officers Needed for November Election

The Fairfax County Office of Elections is looking for election officers to work at polling sites for the Tuesday, November 6, 2007 General Election. The need is particularly acute in Sully District. The greater the shortage of officers, the longer it will take to vote at the polls.

Applicants must be registered to vote in the Commonwealth of Virginia and cannot hold elective office or be the employee of an elected official. Election officers must be available to work the entire day on November 6th, beginning at 5:00 a.m., until all tallies have been completed and all voting equipment secured. All officers are required to attend one training class lasting about two hours, prior to the election. The full-day pay ranges from \$100 to \$200, depending on responsibilities.
